MARCH MADNESS is almost here! Yes some would say this refers to the great NCAA basketball tournament. Others would say it refers to the crazy, unpredictable weather in March. Kim and I were in Gatlinburg, TN once in the beginning of March and we went to bed about midnight and temperature was 70 the degrees Fahrenheit outside and I woke up about 6am the next morning and had to do a double take as I peered out the window and saw white flakes falling

from the sky...it was 30 degrees outside... the temp had dropped a crazy 40 degrees in 6 hours. Now that is mad weather.

When we speak of madness in sports scheduling to the weather, I believe we go in between the extremes of something we enjoy and something we are intrigued by but do not necessarily enjoy. We are on the precipice of the wildness of extremes, and no matter how we look at it it is exciting.

The words of the song written by Matt Redman *Undignified* are taken from a story right out of Scripture that relays for us a story of madness, passion, and excitement. The story is found in 2 Samuel 6 when King David at the end of the chapter is attempting to bring the ark of the covenant for the second time back to its rightful resting place within God's sanctuary in the tabernacle in Jerusalem. The ark of the covenant was a symbol of the abiding presence and power of God among the people of Israel which lost its significance when the Israelites treated it like a gimmick and good luck charm and sinned against God, and, for a time, lost their most valuable possession, the ark, to their antagonistic enemies the Philistines.

The entrance of the ark of the covenant back into Jerusalem was a monumental event. The Israelite leader, King David, led the celebration of the event as He, above anyone else, realized that this was a momentous occasion that had to honor God thoroughly in ever aspect.

King David, caught up in the madness of the moment and with great humility before God, stripped off his kingly robes and danced madly before the King of Kings and Lord of Lords. His own wife did not understand what he was doing for she had lost the vision...the vision with which the people would escape death...the vision of God Almighty and His Word and His purposes.

Even though, no one seemed to understand like David, when rebuked for his humility, he simply said that he would do it again as he states: *I will become even more undignified than this.*

People may not always understand your madness before the King of Kings and Lord of Lords, but really it is not about them, it is about Him. David was confident that he had acted properly, he was confident of His relationship with God, he was confident he was doing the right thing, and he couldn't help but be mad for His King. People may not always understand, but when you are right with the King there is excitement!!!

The Lorica of St. Patrick

Patrick, the patron saint of Ireland, was a unique servant of God who led thousands into Christianity. He was born in 387 and died in 493. Here is a small portion of St. Patrick's

statement of devotion to God: I bind to myself today God's Power to quide me, God's Might to uphold me, God's Wisdom to teach me, God's Eye to watch over me, God's Ear to hear me, God's Word to give me speech, God's Hand to quide me, God's Way to lie before me, God's Shield to shelter me, God's Host to secure me. Against the snares of demons, Against the seductions of vices, Against the lusts of nature, Against everyone who meditates injury to me, Whether far or near, Whether few or with many.

In many places, March is notoriously windy: "In like a lion ...!" Though I don't like the damp chill that's often part of the transition to spring, I love windy days. Something about the air's movement — a gentle breeze or ferocious gale blowing through trees, against the house, in my hair — breeds excitement in me, anticipation that something new is astir.



How fitting that in conversation with Nicodemus, Jesus said, "The wind blows where it chooses, and you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes. So it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit" (John 3:8, NRSV). Like Nicodemus, we fail to comprehend the Spirit of God. But Jesus reminds us that though we can't see the Spirit, we feel his love, see his actions of justice and hear his sounds. These include kind words, bold preaching, weeping for another, shared laughter and songs of praise. -- Heidi Mann

The Comfort of our Our Middle-C GOD

During college, while living in a boarding house, author Lloyd Douglas befriended a retiree. The man, a homebound former music teacher, shared a morning ritual with Douglas, who would walk down to the man's floor, open his door and ask, "What's the good news?"

Every day the man responded by tapping a tuning fork against his wheelchair and saying, "That's middle C. It was middle C yesterday. It will be middle C tomorrow. It will be middle C a thousand years from now. The tenor upstairs sings flat, the piano across the hall is out of tune, but, my friend, that is middle C!" If middle C's pitch value isn't exactly 261.63 Hz, then your piano needs to be tuned. How comforting that dependability is for musicians — and their listeners. Like middle C, God is steadfast and reliable. In this fast-paced world, praise God for the good news he declares to us: "I the LORD do not change" (Malachi 3:6).

On the "Three Sides" podcast (ELCA, Sept. 6, 2018), Wendy Davidson, a leader at the Kellogg Company, shares how her Christianity informs her work. Because her adult faith emerged from several denominational influences, she considers variety to be a strength, not only spiritually but throughout life.



Davidson encourages her co-workers to bring their unique personalities and ideas to the table to create a metaphorical salad. "It doesn't mean that the salad now becomes one homogenous blob; it is still distinctly the flavors of the salad ingredients," she says. "But they've all found a way to come together to make something that much more flavorful than they could have been all on their own."

Viewing church and our communities this way could be transformative. What if we welcome different people, invite ideas and resist melding everything into one giant blob? Then we can savor each "ingredient" and the resulting gourmet dish. Delicious!
